Course Title: Introduction to Ceramic Arts

Course Duration: 14 Weeks

Course Description: This course provides an introduction to the fundamental techniques, materials, and concepts of ceramic arts. - Conducting a Raku firing session (if facilities permit)

Week 10: Alternative Firing Techniques (Optional)

• Introduction to pit firing, smoke firing, and other alternative firing techniques

Week 11: Advanced Wheel Throwing Techniques

- Creating more complex forms (e.g., bowls with lids, pitchers)
- Exploring altered and assembled wheel-thrown forms

Week 12: Sculptural Ceramics

- Introduction to sculptural techniques in ceramics
- Creating free-standing sculptures and relief sculptures

Week 13: Glaze Testing and Experimentation

- Developing custom glazes and glaze combinations
- Testing glazes on sample tiles

Week 14: Critique and Reflection

- Reviewing and discussing completed projects
- Reflecting on personal progress and growth throughout the course

Assessment Methods:

- Class participation and engagement
- Completion of assigned projects
- Quizzes and/or short assessments on techniques and concepts
- Final project and presentation

Materials Needed:

- Various types of clay (earthenware, stoneware, porcelain)
- Basic ceramic tools (kiln, pottery wheel, hand-building tools)
- Glazes, underglazes, and other surface decoration materials
- Kiln access for bisque and glaze firing
